Using a two-cohort longitudinal design (7<sup>th</sup> to 9<sup>th</sup> grade and 11-grade to post-secondary) and in-depth qualitative methods with a quantitative component, we will analyze the phenomena of YARs from the perspective of youth, to understand how they choose, assess and utilize YARs, their potential social capital and psychosocial benefits, and how settings can foster or constrain youths' and adults' abilities to develop connections.
